 \bigcirc Keep the same fingering. Practice with just one hand may be helpful.

 \bigcirc Some fingering (see e.g., in the 2nd bar the last note C for the right hand with a sign "1-2" on the top) are indispensable technique for pieces from the Baroque to the early classical music era. This works for:

(1) to play *legato* (connecting notes. Here 3rd, 9th, 27th, 38th and 39th bar for right hand, and 18th and 23rd bar for the left)

(2) to warrant a correct strike, esp. in a leap

○With some exceptions, it is a rule of thumb for a piano that when the tone is high-pitched, play loud (*forte*), when low-pitched, play quiet (*piano*), and make *crescendo* (gradually louder) when melody ascending, make *diminuendo* (gradually quieter) when descending,

○With a modern piano, playing *piano* and/or *forte* is much easier than doing so with a harpsichord. By taking this opportunity, play G of the right hand of the 21st and the 46th bar, the highest note of all in this score, with strength.

 \bigcirc It is suggested to play quieter for the part Fand the part H both of which are accompanied with the words.

 \bigcirc For the second performance of the 30th bar, play *ritardaondo* (play gradually slower) so that the auditor could know the end.
